Dear Friends,

As many of you may know, Haiti has held a special place in my life for many years. My experiences with the people and the leadership of the country have taught me many lessons and have been among my most personal concerns, both in my time in office and since.

Thanks to the dedicated efforts of the CGI community, over the past four years we have seen leaders from across the public and private sectors develop more than 100 commitments that include a focus on Haiti, 80 of which involve work solely based in the country. As the third anniversary of the inception of the Haiti Action Network approaches, an opportune time presents itself to take stock of what progress has been made.

Since the 2009 Clinton Global Initiative Annual Meeting, the Haiti Action Network has met 21 times and has engaged over 60 CGI member organisations in our work. In 2010, the Abundance Project for Global Health committed to strengthen health delivery systems and medical education in Haiti and other resource-poor areas. Among its projects to date in Haiti, the Abundance Project has funded a Fellow, who has implemented new models of teaching, research, and community-based health care delivery, as well as expanded its Global Health Delivery Online program. Looking forward, the project seeks to scale up mental health programs.

In 2010, BRAC committed to develop a Haitian Limb and Brace Center to provide prosthetics and orthotics services to Haitians, especially those injured in the earthquake. Since its opening in September 2010, the center has provided services to more than 1,200 patients. More than 100 patients have received artificial limbs, 1,123 patients have received braces, and more than 1,350 patients have received counseling and physiotherapy.

In 2009, Fonkoze and its partners committed to implement a replicable and cost-effective approach to reduce extreme poverty and improve health outcomes in Central Haiti. The organizations have improved health, reduced mortality from malnutrition, and increased access to high-quality training and educational opportunities for rural youth. More than one million people have improved access to health services and almost 1,500 families have moved out of poverty, impacting nearly 5,000 people.

In 2010, Child Relief International committed to funding water projects to help 1,000,000 Haitians gain access to clean water. Through the installation of water tanks and chlorinators in schools and community reservoirs in the Southeast Department, Child Relief International aims to reduce waterborne illnesses and other types of infectious agents transmitted by drinking unclean water. As of August, the Clean Water Campaign in Southeast Haiti has added 108,215 new beneficiaries, including 18,705 students.

In 2011, Delos Living and Fondation L'athletique D'Haiti committed to co-develop, construct, and manage the first professional soccer league stadium in Haiti. The Phoenix Stadium will house the first Haitian soccer league, serve as a catalyst to revitalize sport and football in Haiti, and foster economic development by creating approximately 500 jobs. Recent progress includes finalization of the stadium design and renderings by Carlos Zapata. Ground breaking is expected to take place by the end of the year.

In 2010, EarthSpark committed to expanding its clean energy stores and creating two microgrids to help eradicate energy poverty in Haiti. To date, in addition to its clean energy store in Les Anglais, EarthSpark has implemented a "rent-to-own" product for efficient cookstoves and solar products. It is also preparing to launch its first microgrid, which will be owned and operated by Haitian business partners.

In 2010, University of the People committed to provide tuition-free university education to 250 Haitian students over three years. As of April 2012, University of the People has established partnerships with three Haitian NGOs, each of which is now managing a computer center providing students access to higher education, and is funding associate degrees in business administration or computer science for 84 students.

In 2011, D&E Green Enterprises committed to manufacturing and distributing 100,000 environmentally friendly cookstoves, create 30 jobs, and expand its distributor network in Haiti over three years. D&E's EchoRecho stoves improve fuel efficiency by 50 percent and reduce indoor air pollution by 60 percent. So far this year, D&E has manufactured and distributed more than 15,000 stoves and is expanding upon the 25 full-time jobs it has created.

In 2010, Caribbean Harvest committed to combating poverty and malnutrition in rural areas of Haiti through the promotion of fish cage culture. The goal of this commitment is to increase fish availability, create new jobs in the fishing industry, and raise the income of 350 small fish farmers. To date, the project has trained 254 small fish farmers in the fish cage culture method, provided them with production units, and improved their average income from \$400 to more than \$2,000.

In 2010, The Timberland Company committed to developing an agroforestry program in the deforested, rural Artibonite region. This program engages 2,000 smallholder farmers in raising one million trees a year and transplanting these trees onto their own farms. In exchange, farmers receive high yield, non-hybrid seed for their crops, along with training. Thus far, 1.4 million trees have been raised and farmers in the program have increased their crop yields by an average of 45 percent.

In 2010, Architecture for Humanity committed to rebuilding safe, sustainable, transitional, and permanent learning spaces destroyed by the 2010 earthquake in Haiti. In partnership with StudentsRebuild.org and Global Philanthropy Group, the schools are built with funds raised for students by students. To date, three schools have been completed and seven schools are partially completed, seeking support for specific phases.

One of the largest roadblocks to this effort, however, is the lack of strong government guidance regarding land tenure. To address this challenge, HFHI has played a leadership role in creating the Haiti Property Law Working Group, which documents the procedures necessary to transact and assemble land.

To date, the project has helped 176 women to move from subsistence to income generation and greater food security.

The development and technical design of the Parametric Cholera Trigger is currently underway. This product will be used to cost, price, and offer microinsurance coverage in Haiti through MiCRO.

In 2011, Fonkoze committed to creating a permanent, sustainable revolving investment fund with assets of \$1 million to \$1.5 million to fund the projects of Zafèn, a website co-created by Fonkoze with Mercy Corps, Haitian Hometown Association Resource Group, and the Vincentian Family, to link investors to credit-worthy small and medium enterprises (SMEs) in Haiti. Zafèn identifies and vets SMEs and provides monitoring services. The Zafèn revolving investment fund has disbursed loans to several SMEs with funds available thus far.

The commitment of \$100 million has been met by a combination of resources mobilized from private and public sector partners, and IDB resources.

In 2011, Build Change committed to providing technical assistance and training to owners and workers at block-manufacturing facilities in Haiti in order to improve the safety of the post-earthquake rebuilding process. Building on a successful pilot project, Build Change and its partners will mentor nine Haitian small and medium enterprise producers of concrete blocks and will seek to expand this technical assistance and support to 60 manufacturers over two years.

In 2011, the USGBC and its partners committed to building a green orphanage and children's center in Port-au-Prince. Once completed, the new green, high-performance facility will be owned and operated by Fondation Enfant Jesus, and will provide for the immediate health and emotional needs of orphaned children, while offering a safe and legal pathway to adoption. To date, the USGBC has finalized design and construction documentation for the structure with its pro-bono design partner, HOK. The building lot is now ready for construction.

The Tet Kole breeding center pilot project is now fully staffed with trained animal health care workers and is operating near Port-au-Prince as a training and education center for donors, investors, and future NGO partners.

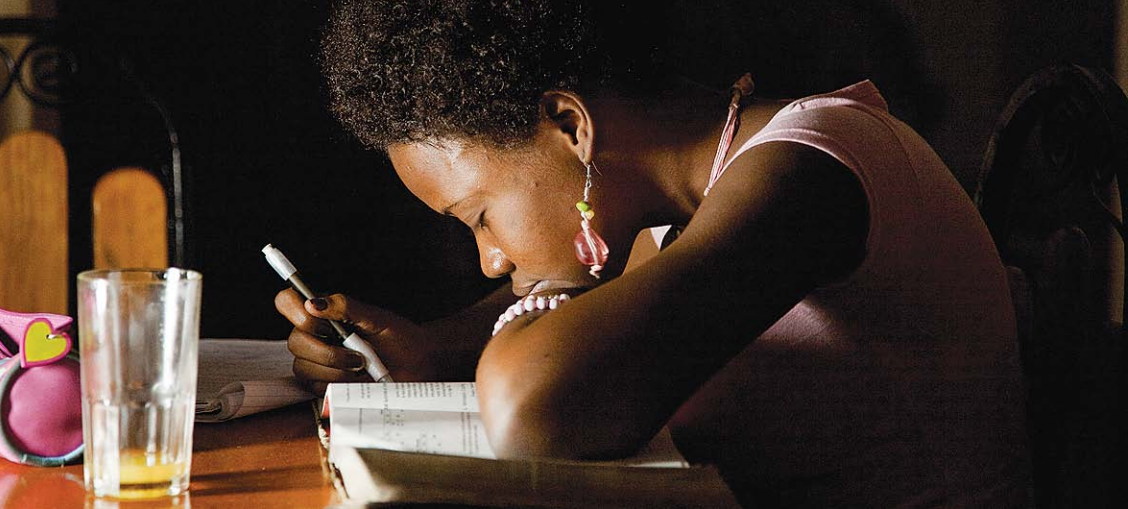

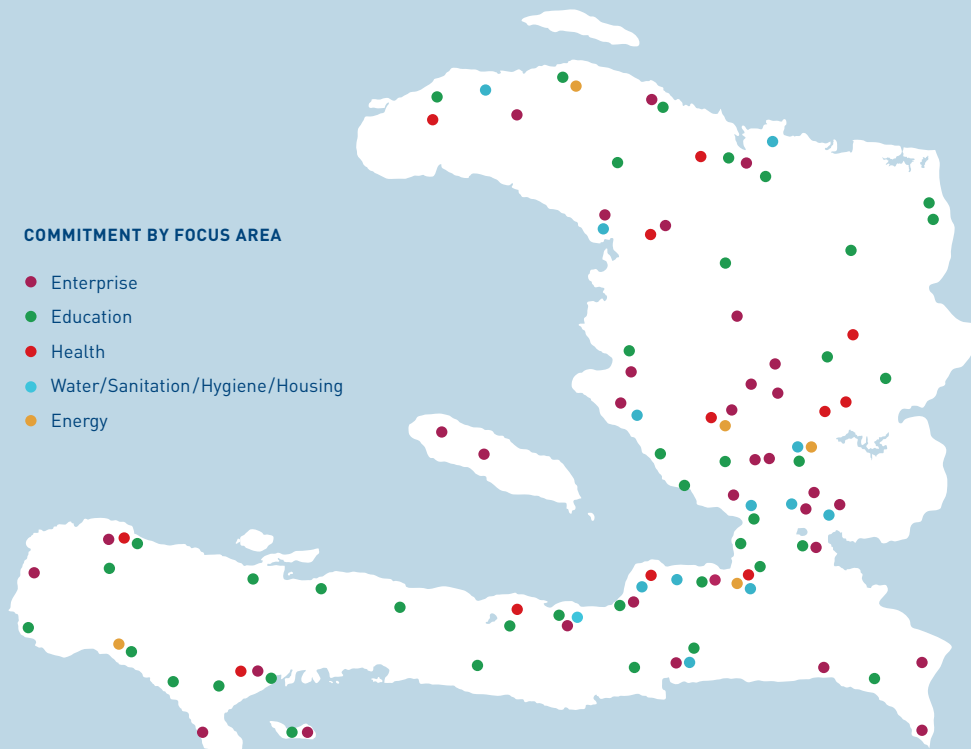

In 2010, BRAC committed to develop a Haitian Limb and Brace Center to provide prosthetics and orthotics services to Haitians, especially those injured in the earthquake. Since its opening in September 2010, the center has provided services to more than 1,200 patients. More than 100 patients have received artificial limbs, 1,123 patients have received braces, and more than 1,350 patients have received counseling and physiotherapy.

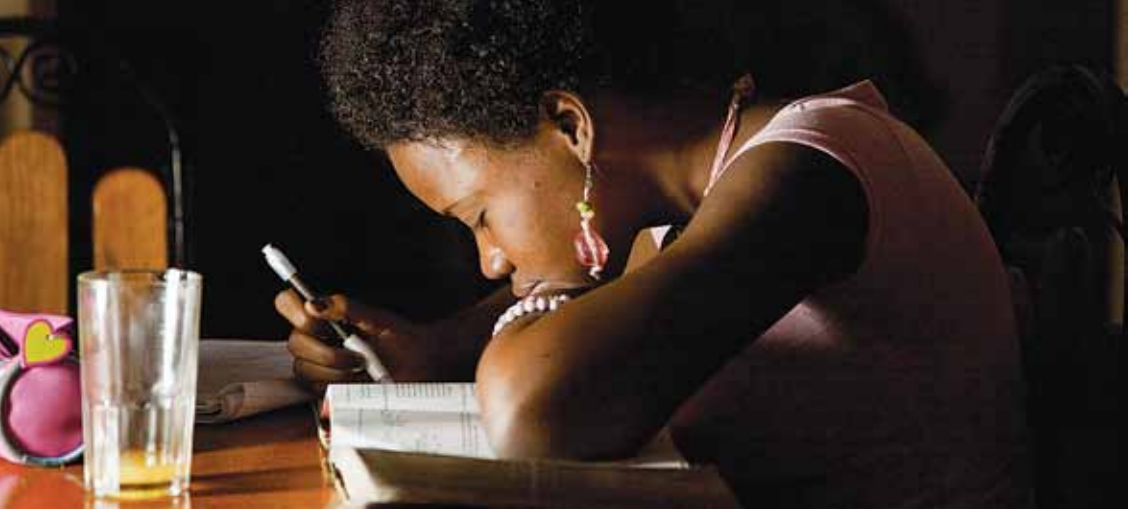
